WHY HAS POPE FRANCIS CALLED FOR A JUBILEE IN 2025?

On 11 February 2022, on the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, Pope Francis issued this letter announcing the Jubilee of 2025:

The Jubilee has always been an event of great spiritual, ecclesial, and social significance in the life of the Church. Ever since 1300, when Boniface VIII instituted the first Holy Year – initially celebrated every hundred years, then, following its biblical precedent, every fifty years, and finally every twenty-five years – God’s holy and faithful people has experienced this celebration as a special gift of grace, characterized by the forgiveness of sins and in particular by the indulgence, which is a full expression of the mercy of God. The faithful, frequently at the conclusion of a lengthy pilgrimage, draw from the spiritual treasury of the Church by passing through the Holy Door and venerating the relics of the Apostles Peter and Paul preserved in Roman basilicas. Down the centuries, millions upon millions of pilgrims have journeyed to these sacred places, bearing living witness to the faith professed in every age.

The Great Jubilee of the year 2000 ushered the Church into the third millennium of her history. Saint John Paul II had long awaited and greatly looked forward to that event, in the hope that all Christians, putting behind their historical divisions, could celebrate together the two thousandth

anniversary of the birth of Jesus Christ, the Saviour of humanity. Now, as the first twenty-five years of the new century draw to a close, we are called to enter into a season of preparation that can enable the Christian people to experience the Holy Year in all its pastoral richness.

A significant step on this journey was already taken with the celebration of the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, which allowed us to appreciate anew all the power and tenderness of the Father’s merciful love, in order to become, in our turn, its witnesses.

In the last two years, not a single country has been unaffected by the sudden outbreak of an epidemic that made us experience first-hand not only the tragedy of dying alone, but also the uncertainty and fleetingness of existence, and in doing so, has changed our very way of life. Together with all our brothers and sisters, we Christians endured those hardships and limitations. Our churches remained closed, as did our schools, factories, offices, shops, and venues for recreation. All of us saw certain freedoms curtailed, while the pandemic generated feelings not only of grief, but also, at times, of doubt, fear and disorientation. The scientific community quickly developed an initial remedy that is gradually permitting us to resume our daily lives. We are fully confident that the epidemic will be overcome and that the world will return to its



usual pattern of personal relationships and social life. This will happen more readily to the extent that we can demonstrate effective solidarity, so that our neighbours most in need will not be neglected, and that everyone can have access to scientific breakthroughs and the necessary medicines.

We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us, and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision. The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire; that is why I have chosen as the motto of the Jubilee, Pilgrims of Hope. This will indeed be the case if we are capable of recovering a sense of universal fraternity and refuse to turn a blind eye to the tragedy of rampant poverty that prevents millions of men, women, young people and children from living in a manner worthy of our human dignity. Here I think in particular of the many refugees forced to abandon their native lands. May the voices of the poor be heard throughout this time of preparation for the Jubilee, which is meant to restore access to the fruits of the earth to everyone. As the Bible teaches, "The sabbath of the land shall provide food for you, for yourself and for your male and female slaves and for your hired servant and the sojourner who lives with you; for your cattle also, and for the beasts that are in your land, all its yield shall be for food" (Lev 25:6-7).

The spiritual dimension of the Jubilee, which calls for conversion, should also embrace these fundamental aspects of our life in society as part of a coherent whole. In the realization that all of us are pilgrims on this earth, which the Lord has charged us to till and keep (cf. Gen 2:15), may we never fail, in the course of our sojourn, to contemplate the beauty of creation and care for our common home. It is my hope that the coming Jubilee Year will be celebrated and experienced with this intention too. Growing numbers of men and women, including many young people and children, have come to realize that care for creation is an essential expression of our faith in God and our obedience to his will.

As is customary, the Bull of Indiction, to be issued in due course, will contain the necessary guidelines for celebrating the Jubilee of 2025. In this time of



preparation, I would greatly desire that we devote 2024, the year preceding the Jubilee event, to a great "symphony" of prayer. Prayer, above all else, to renew our desire to be in the presence of the Lord, to listen to him and to adore him. Prayer, moreover, to thank God for the many gifts of his love for us and to praise his work in creation, which summons everyone to respect it and to take concrete and responsible steps to protect it.

Prayer as the expression of a single "heart and soul" (cf. Acts 4:32), which then translates into solidarity and the sharing of our daily bread. Prayer that makes it possible for every man and woman in this world to turn to the one God and to reveal to him what lies hidden in the depths of their heart. Prayer as the royal road to holiness, which enables us to be contemplative even in the midst of activity. In a word, may it be an intense year of prayer in which hearts are opened to receive the outpouring of God's grace and to make the "Our Father," the prayer Jesus taught us, the life programme of each of his disciples.

I ask the Blessed Virgin Mary to accompany the Church on the journey of preparation for the grace-filled event of the Jubilee, and to you and your co-workers, with gratitude, I cordially send my Blessing.

This interview was done through specific questions given to Bro. Varghese Mandapathil, The Assistant General in charge of the Province of East Africa. From 01 to 18 November Bro. Varghese Mandapathil visited the communities of the Province of East Africa in Kenya and Tanzania. The interview was aimed at knowing the experience of Bro. Varghese's first visit to PEA and sharing the reality of the mission of the Brothers of St. Gabriel in these countries.

How has your first visit to the Province of East Africa been so far? Any memorable moments you'd like to share?

My maiden visit to the province of East Africa was a memorable experience. I am impressed by the 'Great African spirit' of brotherly bonds in the communities, vibrant spiritual culture, and the celebration of life and spirituality through music, art, and dance.

What are your impressions of the Brothers' work and community life in this province?

The Province of East Africa is a young and vibrant province with 40 Brothers with Temporary vows. Even the finally professed Brothers are comparatively very young. Most centres are in rural or semi-urban areas, reaching out to the less privileged. They are happy as a community and are focused on their mission in general.

In your view, how is the mission of the Montfort Brothers of St. Gabriel making a difference in the lives of the people here?

The education mission and the Brothers' involvement in forming the student's character in the boardings, as most of the schools are residential in nature, is impacting the lives of the students in our institutions.



What do you see as the major challenges faced by the Brothers in this province?

Training and equipping the young Brothers to take up responsibility is one of the main challenges the Province is facing. It is also an opportunity to empower the young Brothers and prepare them for the future mission.

Another challenge is to make the communities self-sufficient financially. This will require that the Brothers work hard to impart quality education so that the number of students in the institutions increases substantially to make it financially viable.

What words of encouragement would you give to the Brothers of East Africa to further enhance their mission?

I appreciate the great missionary work being done in Tanzania and Kenya. I wish that they begin a few more 'Primary schools' that will help them to be financially self-sufficient. They also need to carefully monitor the existing schools to ensure that they improve the educational standards in these schools and attract more students so that the schools become financially viable.

What new opportunities or areas of growth do you foresee for the Province of East Africa in the coming years?

The Brothers are doing well in promoting vocations in the Province. There are a good number of candidates and first professions in the Province. They are doing well in taking care of the initial stages of formation. It is important to ensure quality over quantity in the initial stages of formation.

How can the work being done here inspire or contribute to the global mission of the Montfort Brothers of St. Gabriel?

The Brothers in Tanzania and Kenya (I visited only these two countries) are trying their best to make the Montfortian Education Mission in these countries special and growth-oriented. They focus on Holistic child-centred education, which aligns with the Global education mission of the Montfort Brothers of St. Gabriel.


Connectivity: All of us are interconnected and part of each other. Connectivity is a necessity in a classroom as we can improve the learning capacity and build up confidence and self-esteem by being connected to the students, valuing their values, learning, and recognising and developing their skills and talents. We need to liberate, transform and empower them for a better future.



Mindfulness: It is a window to God. We need to celebrate the Divine, the Sacredness within us, around us and in all our activities by mindfulness. We must not destroy it by our ego and selfishness.

Mindfulness helps us to:

- to create a way to stop and go
- to do everything in the presence of God
- to affirm that Divine power and self-effort can work miracles in our lives and in the lives of the students.
- To activate the SIM-Self Internal Mentor and bring about change in me, as I am the only person who can change me.



The exercises to keep us mindful are very easy to practise:

Walking: Helps to have connectivity with the earth and nature

Breathing: It is life-giving and healing

Gardening: It enables co-creative relationship

Cooking with love: Food can heal us and bind us together in loving friendship

Cleaning: It purifies us, the surroundings and our mind

Simplicity: It leads us to be simple in our thoughts, words and deeds

Contemplative Prayer: One who is deeply rooted in the Love of God can free himself/herself from fear, anxiety and guilt

Death: The Sufis say, 'Nothing is possible in love without death'. Every day, something in us dies, and there is rebirth and renewal. Nature is eternally young because she is always dying.

Seeds: The seeds are a metaphor for the hidden potential in us and the students. We should nurture them through consistent self-motivated effort, care and patience.

Breathing: In the hustle and bustle of modern life most of the time one is drawn to stress. Conscious breathing exercises facilitate spiritual connection, healing and inner peace. It harmonizes the mind and body and can treasure breath as a divine gift of life. One is led to relaxation, inner freedom, and to be one's best. Breathing exercises and mindfulness are of great help to focus on, as there are situations in our day-to-day life that make us tensed, and we project it in our class and into our teaching. Practising these two things can keep us calm and quiet.

The only way to do a great job is to love what we do. We need to put more love into our teaching and in our relationship with our students. With a Personal Passionate Presence we can make our teaching more effective, interesting and inspiring. A teacher is a transforming presence. The aim of education is to enable students to understand the world around them and the talents within them so that they can become fulfilled individuals and active, compassionate citizens.

Personalities: The topic of personality was an eye-opener for all of us.

Tips to improve student-teacher relationship

- Affirm and validate
- Reassure them about social situations
- Suggest a new classroom design
- Encourage class participation
- Build in alone time
- Invite their friends over
- Give them a wait time





Genaro Fresno, first explained to us what a General Chapter was, its development and its meaning for the Congregation; and then he focused on the theme and motto of this XXXIII General Chapter.

For the explanation of the theme, THE MONFORTIAN PROPHETIC PRESENCE IN THE 21ST CENTURY and the motto, LISTENING AND ACTING WITH AUDACITY, Brother Provincial made use of the seven grouped signs that appeared in the logo, which define the spirit in which the Chapter wanted to work, and which also define the horizon of the religious Institute beyond the Chapter.

After this explanation, he introduced us to the new Central Administration that had been elected to animate and guide the Congregation for the next

six years and to face the challenges ahead.

The Bro. Provincial then showed us the minutes of the Chapter, where priorities and strategies, grouped into four themes, were agreed upon by the capitulant Brothers to be prophetic witnesses of our time.

A NEW ERA IN GABRIELIST FOOD EDUCATION

A Necessary Global Approach

Improving diet, increasing physical activity, and reducing sedentary behavior are critical health priorities for individuals and populations across various living environments.

To address these challenges, it is essential to implement a range of strategies within a health promotion framework, as defined by the WHO in 1986. Given that the determinants of food consumption and physical activity are multifaceted (Figure), interventions must operate at the level of public policy and the environments in which individuals live. Such an integrated approach not only proves more effective but also ensures a balance between individual and collective responsibility in health promotion. This equilibrium emphasizes both the adoption of responsible individual behaviors and the creation of environments conducive to health-promoting practices. Under these optimal conditions, nutrition education can achieve its intended impact on both individuals and communities.

In the context of nutritional education, the Church plays a pivotal role, striving to facilitate swift and meaningful progress toward realization.

The Church's Role in Food Education

Ecclesiastical involvement necessitates the active participation of all members. As integral members

of the Church, the Brothers of Saint Gabriel are called to a dual responsibility: first, as Christians fulfilling their evangelical mission, and second, as educators. This dual role requires them to understand the complexities of modern food systems and master the foundational principles of nutrition education.

Foundations of Nutrition Education

In the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), public health policies adopt a broad approach to nutrition, encompassing both dietary intake and energy expenditure through physical activity. However, education is more than merely disseminating information. Nutritional education is a comprehensive, ongoing process of learning and developing knowledge, interpersonal skills, and practical competencies. This empowers individuals or groups to make informed decisions about their dietary and physical activity habits.

Effective nutritional education relies on positive, non-stigmatizing communication. It is participatory, respectful of individuals' values and cultures, and must remain accessible and equitable, avoiding the perpetuation of social health disparities.

Activities in Nutrition Education

Nutrition education extends beyond teaching about balanced diets or the health benefits of physical

activity. It involves engaging communities to explore their perceptions, barriers, and motivators regarding dietary and physical activity behaviors. This collaborative approach recognizes and builds upon existing knowledge while encouraging the acquisition of new skills.

A diverse range of activities can be tailored to specific target groups (e.g., children, teenagers, pregnant women, the elderly, or vulnerable populations) and settings (e.g., schools, workplaces, leisure centers, homes, or care facilities).

These activities address all aspects of eating biological, sensory, social, and ecological helping individuals:

- Adapt their diets to meet personal needs, cultural traditions, and preferences.
- Balance their meals using different food groups.



- Develop sensory awareness through the discovery of various tastes and flavors.
- Make informed consumer choices by interpreting labels and media messages.
- Rediscover the origins, production, and processing of food.
- Promote ecological and ethical consumption practices.
- Create social connections through the preparation and sharing of meals.

The Benefits of Food Education

For nutritional guidance to resonate with "diverse eaters," education must go beyond standard nutrition training to encompass food culture education. This shifts the focus from enforcing norms to fostering creativity and social innovation in food practices and identities.

The family unit, classroom taste explorations, and shared food practices play significant roles in socializing children into food cultures. These





experiences help individuals understand the diversity of food systems while providing a foundation for the development of culinary and gastronomic identities.

Food culture education values consumers as active participants in the creation and reinterpretation of inherited food practices. Playful interactions often allow individuals to transition from rigid norms to flexible, innovative paradigms.

This approach encourages people to:

- Explore and internalize culinary knowledge and table manners.
- Reflect critically and creatively on their food experiences.
- Appreciate the sensory and emotional dimensions of eating.
- Understand the seasonal and cultural contexts of food.

Developing "Jubilant Taste"

Food culture education fosters a "jubilant taste,"






MISSIONARY PATHS OF OUR JUBILANT BROTHERS

Brother Augustin hails from the Saint Luc parish of Samba Dia, specifically from the Saint Michel parish sector of Mbissel. After completing his high school diploma in 1997, he joined the Novitiate in Thiès, where he underwent two years of training from 1997 to 1999. On 25 June 1999, he took his first vows at Saint Anne's Cathedral in Thiès, joining the Brothers of Saint Gabriel congregation. From 1999 to 2000, he received pedagogical training at the CFP of Mbour. From 2000 to 2002, he began his teaching career at the primary level in the Sine College of Fatick. Subsequently, from 2002 to 2003, he was assigned to the René Merceron Institution in Mbour, where he obtained his Teaching Aptitude Certificate (CAP). From 2003 to 2007, he was assigned to the Saint Gabriel College in Thiès where he taught history and geography. After four

Like his fellow jubilarian, Brother Maurice is also from Saint Luke parish in Samba Dia, and from the Saint Michael parish sector in Mbissel. In 1996, after his high school education at Saint Gabriel College, he requested a year of reflection. He joined the novitiate in Thiès, where he completed two years of training from 1997 to 1999. On June 25, 1999, at the Sainte Anne Cathedral in Thiès, he took vows, thus joining the Congregation of the Brothers of Saint Gabriel. From 1999 to 2000, he underwent pedagogical and teacher training at the CFP in Mbour. From 2000 to 2002, he served as primary school teacher at the Aloyse Kobes in Dakar.

years of service in Thiès, he returned to Mbour, serving as the Director of the René Merceron Institution from 2007 to 2015. From 2015 to 2018, he studied at the CELAF Institute in Abidjan, where he achieved a Bachelor's Degree in Education and Training Sciences. In 2019, he pursued his training as a Formator at the Catholic Institute of Paris. He has presented a thesis on interculturality. From 2019 to 2022, he was appointed by the Central Administration as the head of the international Francophone novitiate in Thiès. In addition to this role, he accepted the responsibility of the inter-novitiate in Dakar from 2021 to 2022. Since September 2022, Brother Augustin has been on a mission in Burkina Faso. At present, He is serving as Principal Director of Saint Gabriel High School in Manga, Provincial delegate for the Burkina sector, and a Provincial Counsellor. Furthermore, Brother Augustin has been actively involved in the Pastoral movement within the "Cœurs Vaillants and Ames Vaillantes" in Senegal for many years, holding key positions including that of National Councilor for this movement.

From 2002 to 2003, he was assigned to Saint Gabriel College as a French teacher. After a year of service, he was sent to Assumption University in Bangkok. From 2003 to 2007, and graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in English Business.

Following graduation, he was posted as Headmaster to Collège Saint Gabriel in Dédougou, Burkina Faso. After seven (7) years in Burkina, he returned to Malika, Senegal, in 2014, where he took on the role of Deputy Head Teacher. A year later, in 2015, he was transferred to Mbour as Principal of René Merceron Institution, a position he held until 2019. From 2019 to 2023, he was reassigned to Malika as Principal. At the same time, he attended courses at Polytechnic School of Dakar and obtained a Master's Degree in Human Resource Management. Brother Maurice is currently Principal of Collège Saint Gabriel in Thiès, a post he has held since September 2023.

From summer mountain walks to spiritual hikes..

For many years, some Brothers have been in the habit of escaping for several weeks in summer to the heights of the Alps or the Pyrenees to leave behind the daily cares of life and turn their gaze towards the One we know to be at the origin of these breathtaking landscapes. And for nearly 20 years, the signatories of these lines have been meeting for three weeks during the summer for the same purpose.

From the Maurienne to the Vanoise massifs, from the Tarentaise to the Beaufortain and then the Queyras, our boots have covered hundreds of kilometres of trails with varying gradients. Most of the time, with rucksacks and poles in hand, we walked at our own pace, in silence: a physical experience, of course, but also a spiritual one, contemplating the beauty that surrounds us and marveling at the surprising encounters we made. What a joy it is to turn a bend and catch a glimpse of a ballet of marmots, ibex snapping their horns, or chamois dancing on the snow, even if this has become rarer in recent years! Verses 18 and 24 of Psalm 103 then take on a very special meaning:

"To the chamois, the high mountains, the marmots, the shelter of the rocks. What profusion in your works, Lord! All this your wisdom has done."

The many 'Greetings' expressed as we passed other hikers sometimes extended into a spontaneous and unexpected exchange: furtive moments always full of human warmth. And among all these encounters, we still remember the one we had at the summit of the Râteau d'Aussois in the Vanoise, at over 3,000 m, in 2010.



At the start of this hike, we see three men who take the same path as us. We ask ourselves, "Are they not Priests or Religious men?" We lose sight of them because the climb is hard, especially the last meters when the path is stony without too much distinguishing.

After working up a considerable sweat in this final stage, the goal is achieved, and our three men clearly had the same objective since they were here. Who started the conversation? We can't remember, but we found out that they were wondering the same thing about us, and so a summit meeting took place between three Brothers from Saint-Gabriel and three Brothers from Ploërmel! Gabriel Deshayes must still be smiling!



"Be ready in the morning and then come up on Mount Sinai. Present yourself to me there on top of the mountain." Exodus 34:2

After three weeks of hiking, we're continuing our spiritual trek to another summit, that of the Foyer de Charité de La Flatière. Here, only the Holy Spirit can know whether, with his help, we will reach greater or lesser heights of holiness. But buoyed up by the beauty of the setting, the prayer of the community, the maternal presence of Mary, and the many teachings received, our souls cannot help but soar towards God, for Him.

Let us sing, praise and pray to Him.

After the effort comes the comfort of pulling the picnic out of the bag: a very pleasant moment, especially when we are sitting on the banks of a torrent, which graciously offers us a fridge within easy reach. We then replenish our strength, lulled by the gentle music of the water rushing down the slope, rubbing against the pebbles. You visit the earth and give it water; the streams of God abound with water'. (Ps 64, 10)

Crossing a stream that rises to over 3,000 m, we reached it twice, contemplating a 360° panorama and meditating in the small chapel perched on the summit. 'When the day comes, you will rise on the mountain and stand before me on the top of the mountain' (Ex 34:2).

This Mount Tabor, not Galileo's 600 m peak, but the one in the Maurienne, near the Italian border, at over 3,000 m, was reached on two occasions, offering 360° panoramic views and time for contemplation in the little chapel perched on the summit.

A day at Black Thunder Amusement Park provided a break from routine, filled with adventure and fun that helped us build friendships and relax.


Festive Celebrations – Diwali:


7. Preparation for Apostolic Experience:

Reflection on My Apostolic Experience Eachinkadu, Novitiate, Yercaud




A religious Brother named R.V. Thomas was having lunch in a three-star hotel. A scene that unfolded outside his hotel deeply moved him; he saw a beggar eating scraps from a dustbin along with dogs, pigs, and cows. He helped the beggar, giving him a bath, food, and medicine. Despite his care, the beggar passed away the following day, and R.V. Thomas gave him a dignified burial. This experience profoundly impacted him and led to the establishment of St. Joseph's Hospices for the dying destitute.

I had the privilege of staying at St. Joseph's Hospices for two weeks, along with six novices. This stay has profoundly shaped my understanding of service, life, and the poor. I would like to share my reflection on these two points: My Life and the Poor.

My Life: Embracing the Cross of Service

At the start of my service at the hospice, I found it very difficult to extend my hands to help the destitutes. There were inmates with various needs: mentally ill, physically handicapped, disabled, and others in extreme conditions. I found myself



questioning, “Did Jesus or St. Montfort experience such suffering in their lives?” In that moment, I felt the gentle whisper of Jesus, “I came that they may have life, and have it more abundantly” (John 10:10). My life is a gift from God, and it is my duty to live it in accordance with His will, serving those who are abandoned and rejected by society.

“Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.” - Matthew 25:40

St. Montfort’s words, “No cross, what a cross,” resonated deeply with me. He reminds us that, although it is difficult to serve others, especially in such dire circumstances, this is the very path to true fulfilment and eternal life. As I faced the discomfort of working in such a challenging environment, I realised that every hardship was an opportunity to grow in faith and compassion. I recall the words from Sirach 2:1, “My son, if you come forward to serve the Lord, prepare yourself for temptation.” These words reminded me that service is not always easy, but it is a way to deepen our relationship with God.

I come from a comfortable background where my needs were always met. However, when I began working with the dying destitute, I found it difficult to face the overwhelming needs around me. The stench, the dirt, the suffering...etc. It was all too much at first. But as I reflected on Christ’s life, I remembered how He served the marginalized and the sick, how He reached out to those who were rejected. He embraced the cross for the salvation of humanity. This became a source of inspiration for me, helping me to move beyond my comfort zone and serve with an open heart.

I asked myself, “Can I see Jesus in all of these inmates?” St. Montfort’s example inspires me to imitate him and serve Christ. Through these experiences, I have learned to let go of negative thoughts and embrace my mission of serving with love, in the name of God. Every day in the hospice became a new experience—a chance to surrender my own will to God and serve as He calls me to. The words of Jesus in Matthew 25:40 echo in



my heart: “Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.” This is the essence of discipleship. I serve the poor and the destitute because in doing so, I serve Christ Himself.

The Poor: Embracing Solidarity and Joy in Giving
I come from a middle-class family, and while I have faced challenges in my own life, I have always had my basic needs met. There are times, however, when I feel deprived or long for something I cannot have. In those moments, I understand, even if just a little, the feeling of poverty. Yet, I also realize that poverty is not only about material deprivation—it is also about the longing for something deeper, the need for love, dignity, and respect. The poor, in their outward suffering, have something to teach us about resilience, humility, and the profound gift of community.

The poor need our help, but the question is: who will provide for them? It is easy to wait for someone else to act, but as followers of Christ, we are called to respond. There is more joy in giving than in receiving, as Scripture tells us. God is joy because God is love, and to experience true joy, I must love others as He has loved me. The more I give, the more I receive in return—not in material things, but in spiritual growth, peace, and the joy that comes from serving others.

“I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Now choose life, so that you and your children may live.” - Deuteronomy 30:19



Through my time at the hospice, I realized that the poor are not rejected by God; they are loved deeply by Him. As Jesus says, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:3). The poor are a reflection of Christ's humility. They are not to be pitied or ignored but embraced as brothers and sisters. In serving them, I find that I am drawn closer to Christ. I have come to understand that poverty is not merely a social condition—it is a spiritual call. Jesus became poor for our sake, and He calls us to enter into solidarity with the poor. The challenge is not just to meet the immediate needs of the poor but to stand with them, to see them as equals, to recognize their humanity, and to listen to their stories.

Living for Christ in Every Moment

Through my experiences in the hospice and my reflection on the life of Jesus and St. Montfort, I have come to realize that my life is not my own. It is meant to be lived for others, particularly the poor, the sick, and the marginalized. By following Christ's example of selfless service, I find true fulfillment.

In every act of service, I am reminded of the words from Deuteronomy 30:19: "I have set before you life

and death, blessings and curses. Now choose life, so that you and your children may live." Choosing life means choosing to serve others, especially those who are most in need.

I commit myself to living my life for others, by serving Christ in every person, whether in words or in actions. I am reminded that the poor are not a burden but a gift, an opportunity for us to grow in love and humility. By serving them, I am serving Christ. And through Christ, I will find the deepest joy, peace, and purpose in life.

Impact of Smartphones on Our Religious Life and Mission



Introduction

Many Brothers use these platforms to post reflections, educational content, and inspiring messages, expanding our reach to youth and others who may not interact directly with us in physical settings.

Challenges and Negative Aspects of Smartphone Use

1. Distraction from Spiritual Life: Excessive smartphone use can interfere with our focus on prayer, reflection, and community life. Constant notifications, messages, and updates create interruptions that can detract from our connection with God and dilute the contemplative aspects of our daily routines.





2. Reduced Interpersonal Interaction: While smartphones connect us with the world, they sometimes isolate us from those immediately around us. Excessive use can lead Brothers to spend more time alone, reducing the time dedicated to fraternity and community engagement, which are vital to our congregational life.

3. Mental Fatigue and Reduced Focus: Frequent exposure to digital content, including news, social media, and entertainment, can contribute to mental fatigue and even anxiety. This constant stimulation strains our ability to concentrate on scripture, study, and our mission work, making it harder to live with clarity and purpose.

Reasons for Excessive Smartphone Use

1. Social Connectivity: For many Brothers, smartphones serve as a way to stay connected with family, friends, and news from home. This connectivity, while important, can become a source of distraction if not managed mindfully.

2. Seeking Comfort or Escapism: Sometimes, especially during challenging times, we may turn to smartphones to escape from stress, loneliness, or a lack of fulfilment. Apps, games, and social media can provide temporary relief but can also become addictive, pulling us further away from our spiritual lives.

3. Fear of Missing Out (FOMO): In a world where information flows constantly, some Brothers may feel pressure to stay updated, leading to a tendency to check devices frequently. This behaviour can create a cycle of dependency, where checking the smartphone becomes a habit, often at the cost of peace and focus.

Steps to Cultivate Healthy Smartphone Habits

1. Set Boundaries: Establish specific times for smartphone use, especially in communal settings. Limiting use during meals, prayer times, and reflections allows Brothers to be fully present with each other and with God.

2. Designate Technology-Free Zones: Creating technology-free areas within our homes and communities, such as chapels, dining areas, and common rooms, can encourage face-to-face interactions and strengthen communal bonds.

3. Practice Mindfulness: Be intentional about smartphone usage by periodically asking, “Is this activity helping me grow spiritually or mentally?” Avoid using the phone as a filler activity and instead engage in practices that foster reflection and relaxation.

4. Use Digital Tools Wisely: Set app limits, enable “Do Not Disturb” modes during prayer or community time, and remove unnecessary apps that may contribute to excessive usage. Many devices offer wellness tools to track screen time and suggest healthier patterns.

5. Encourage Accountability: Brothers can support each other by fostering open discussions around smartphone use, helping each other stay accountable, and sharing ways to incorporate digital technology healthily in our spiritual and professional lives.

Conclusion

While smartphones are valuable tools for our mission, the impact of their use on our religious life requires mindful consideration. By finding a balance that allows us to utilize smartphones without allowing them to disrupt our spiritual focus, we can strengthen our community and deepen our commitment to God’s work. MARTYRS OF THE RELIGIOUS PERSECUTION DURING THE SPANISH CIVIL WAR IN 1936



Marcelino LÓPEZ HERNANDO
Brother Bautista María, 36 years old
Born in Cuevas de Juarros
(Burgos)

He was pious as a youth who accompanied his father to the hermitage of Ntra. Sra. del Cerro where he was a devotee of the saint. Once having begun his religious life, he had few years of Scholasticate due to the fact that his obedience swiftly allocated him in charge of the vestments, an occupation that would last for the rest of his life.

With what sorrow he witnessed the departures and farewells of his fellow Brothers that left the Congregation for various motives, with which he demonstrated his great love for his vocation. Pious, he was diligent in his duties and always consistent. Brothers Bautista and Bonifacio were blood brothers but more so religious brothers. They were two of the finest Gabrielite. A pleasure of religious brothers, always smiling, they appeared to be the happiest of men and instilled in the community a great religious optimism.

In 1924 his Superior said of him that he did not have a great intellectual capacity but he had a good spirit and conscientiously fulfilled his duties to the Rule and to his work. He often took advantage of his free time to go to the chapel and visit with devotion the Holy Sacrament. When he visited his family during vacation his could be found in his hermitage directing the holy Rosary. He was always well prepared for martyrdom.

Brother Mauricio, 30 years old
Born in Villasur
(Burgos)

During his education he was an excellent religious youth and was highly regarded by the Superiors. He was never found to be in a bad mood despite the hard times he was forced to endure. He serves his military service in the San Marcial barracks of Burgos in 1928.

Brother Mauricio had a very special friendliness and sensitivity. He was a true bel canto artist and a lover of music and of the arts in general. In his last year, that is to say 1936, he was noted to be somewhat restless he drew from the piano some sonatinas that seemed to contain a certain anger or resentment, in the face of the adverse events that we were living.

In reviewing his resume we can see that he was often transferred between schools since he taught in Arenys de Mar, Viladecans, Bañolas, Castelló de Ampurias and Valls, returning to some of them twice. As had some of the Brothers from Valls, during the persecution he found lodging during some weeks in the home of Mrs. Llenas. Later he was able with some difficulty to reach Can Valls (San Vicente de Montalt) where they felt they were protected, or so many of the Brothers of the Schools thought having the presence of the French flag there.


